

ONE OF this year's RE-volv projects is brought to you by the Solar Ambassador Team at the University of Wisconsin – Milwaukee (UWM). The project is taking place at the River Revitalization Foundation

(RRF), Milwaukee's urban rivers land trust. RRF focuses on the conservation and protection of riparian corridors in the city. Not only is RRF going solar, there are also plans to have a green roof installed in conjunction with solar panels. "RRF wants to be part of a highly visible demonstration project that showcases alternative energy as well as stormwater management. The combination of green roof and solar will give the surrounding neighborhood and community a sample of what they can do on their own buildings to address these issues", said Kimberly Gleffe, Executive Director of RRF. "We also appreciate the partnership of the Solar Ambassador team, helping to implement this project". The Solar Ambassador Team at UWM is in the heart of their 45-day campaign to raise \$10,567.



RRF Campaign to Begin

Small commercial solar installations – including those used by nonprofits and co-ops

 lag behind residential and other solar markets. More than 1.5 million nonprofits and nearly 30,000 co-ops in the United States could be saving money and reducing carbon emissions by going solar, but they often do not

have access to solar financing. RE-volv is changing that through a first-of-its-kind revolving fund to finance solar projects for community-serving nonprofits and co-ops.

"RE-volv.org is a platform where people come together to bring solar power to communities that need it," said Andreas Karelas, RE-volv's Executive Director and founder. "Our new crowdfunding platform empowers people to take action for clean energy and allows them to see the result: solar on the roof". In Milwaukee, RRF will be the 2nd project done with ReVolv; the most recently completed project is on the roof of the Riverwest Co-op.

About RE-volv

RE-volv is a San Francisco-based nonprofit that empowers people to take direct action on climate change by crowdfunding solar energy projects for communityserving organizations. Taxdeductible donations made to RE-volv's crowdfunding campaigns contribute to a revolving fund that provides solar financing for nonprofits and cooperatives around the country. RE-volv raises awareness about solar energy through its community-based solar projects and education and outreach programs. RE-volv is an inaugural member of the White House National Community Solar Partnership and a winner of the U.S. Department of Energy SunShot Catalyst program Business Innovation Award.

REQUIREMENTS: Volunteers must be willing and able to participate in manual labor for at least two hours outdoors in varying weather conditions. Most importantly, a willingness to smile, have fun, and get dirty!

INCENTIVE PROGRAM: Volunteers that donate a total of 10 hours or more in a given year are provided free access to use any of the RRF watercrafts. Availability is determined by fleet size and staffing to unlock canoes and kayaks.

NEWS FROM THE FIELD

RESTORATION:

As a result of our recently awarded Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Great Lakes Restoration Initiative (GLRI) grant RRF was able to expand its Land Management team to have a greater impact on the land we own and manage. Thanks to our field staff leading many volunteers and UWM service learners, partnering with an Operation Dream team, and leading a Cream City Conservation Corps we have improved and maintained several acres of riparian habitat.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS:

- 18 acres of land canvassed for buckthorn eradication
 - 52,000,000 lbs. invasive species removed since we were awarded GLRI in July 2016!
 - Can you believe that there is still more buckthorn?
- 12 lbs. seed cleaned that was collected by RRF staff at several local natural areas! Native seed broadcasted over 16 acres of the 45 acre GLRI project area!
 - DANG, that's a lot of future baby plants!

BIRD BOXES:

While out enjoying the Milwaukee River Greenway, you may see new housing additions to the landscape. Don't fret though, these housing developments are for the birds—nesting boxes! Last summer, RRF's Earn and Learn team assembled 22 nest boxes. This winter our staff, volunteers and Operation Dream youth have been installing the nest boxes throughout Turtle Park, Caesars Park, and Gordon Park in anticipation of the breeding season this spring. The nest boxes come in several different sizes and shapes to attract specific bird species. They are strategically located at the right height, distance, habitat, and direction from each other to appeal to specific birds. The nest boxes were designed to attract the following species: Northern Flickers, Great-Crested Flycatchers, Eastern Bluebirds, and Common Mergansers. Of those species Northern Flicker and Great-Crested Flycatcher populations are in decline, providing an ideal nesting place for them during breeding season in the central city is critical for population sustainability and conservation. Keep a look out this spring and summer for updates on our social media about observations as we monitor the inhabitants of our nest boxes.

PHOTOGRAPHY CONTEST



Wisconsin Images for Conservation is hosting a photography contest to highlight land trust protected properties in the Southeast region. RRF is one of five partners participating.

The entire **Milwaukee River Greenway** within Milwaukee County is open to all registered photographers. **Imagine...**

You walk along the Milwaukee River on a recreational path winding six or so river miles from the city limits at Silver Spring Drive to the harbor at Lake Michigan; this river path then ziazaas through Riverwest, along Brewers Hill and the Beer Line B, past Park East through downtown and the Third Ward to the lake front. The cool river water bubbles over the rocks through a protected park bringing our neighborhoods and communities together. Pedestrian bridges unite east and west at North Avenue and at Locust Street, creating a series of loops for runners, hikers, dogwalkers, and commuters. Finally you reach the Riverwalk where views of downtown unfold, a contrast to the upstream wooded stretch. The greenway restores the river as nature's

gathering place too. This corridor unites the river's rich working past with its economic, recreational, and sustainable present. It is a magnificent place of beauty and refuge in the heart of Milwaukee. You are part of a Milwaukee celebrating its sense of place; a place where fresh water is central to its identity (excerpt from Milwaukee's Central Park vision paper, Vince Bushell).

Several key sites within the Greenway include:

Milwaukee County Parks – Caesar's, Gordon, Riverside, Kern, Hubbard, Lincoln, Estabrook and Meaux; RRF protected – Turtle Park, Beerline Loop trail, Milwaukee Rotary Centennial Arboretum.
